**OTSEGO COUNTY 2012 MONUMENTATION/REMONUMENTATION PROGRAM  
AGREEMENT FOR SURVEY/REMONUMENTATION SERVICES**

1. **Parties.** This agreement made this Twenty-Eighth day of February, 2012, by and between the County of Otsego, a Michigan Municipal Corporation, of Gaylord, Michigan 49735, hereafter COUNTY, and Bob Mitchell & Associates located at 512 West Main Street, Gaylord, Michigan 49735, hereafter CONTRACTOR.
  
2. **Term.** Unless earlier terminated as provided in this Agreement, the term of this Agreement will commence on the date first above written, and continue until December 31, 2012.
  
3. **Definitions.**
  - A. **County Grant Administrator.** Means a person appointed by the Otsego County Board of Commissioners as the individual responsible for completing and submitting the annual Application for a survey and Monumentation Grant to the State of Michigan, and the administering of the approved annual grant.
  
  - B. **County Representative.** Means the County Surveyor, whether elected or appointed, pursuant to Section 95 of Chapter 14 of the Revised Statutes of 1846, being Section 54.95 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.
  
  - C. **Peer Group.** Means not less than three non-associated surveyors appointed by the County Representative. One member of the Peer Group shall be the County Representative, who shall act as chair.
  
  - D. **County Plan.** Means the approved Otsego County Remonumentation Plan.
  
4. **Compensation.** The CONTRACTOR shall perform all work for the PROJECT at the applicable rates indicated on the Professional Fee Schedule attached to and made a part hereof, for the total amount not to exceed **Twelve Thousand Eight Hundred Ninety Five and 00/100 dollars (US \$12,895.00)**. The PROJECT shall be defined as the corners completed (corners to be researched, corners to be monumented or remonumented and corners to have coordinates set) without exceeding the maximum amount.
  
5. **Payment of Compensation.** The OWNER will pay the CONTRACTOR for the work when: (a) the Peer Review Group reviews and concurs with the CONTRACTORS Corner Research & Remonumentation according to the County Plan For Otsego County; (b) furnishes an original Land Corner Recordation Form, or forms if appropriate to the County Representative; (c) furnish one complete set of documents for each corner monumented, remonumented, researched or coordinate set to the County Representative to be placed in the permanent file maintained at the Register of Deeds Office; (d) the County Representative certifies to the appropriate County official or officer that (a), (b) and (c) have been completed and that such completed work is in accordance with the grant; (e) that the County will pay the amount owed and due within 30 days of receipt of itemized invoice, approved by the County Representative and by the County Grant

Administrator. These (a)-(d) requirements will be completed 45 days prior to end of the Grant Agreement, ending 12/31/2012.

Unless otherwise authorized by the County Grant Administrator, the Contractor's work is to be completed no later than October 15, 2012. Said statement shall be in accordance with the schedule of fees and charges outlined in this Contract. If the CONTRACTOR fails to meet this deadline, payment may be withheld at the option of the County Grant Administrator. In the event that the CONTRACTOR fails to meet the deadlines specified within this contract by at least fourteen days, there will be a reduction of \$50.00 per day from the Compensation total beginning on day fifteen. The Grant Administrator can extend deadlines at his/her discretion.

Payment for partial completion of contracts shall be allowed at the discretion of the Grant Administrator.

6. Subcontracting. Nothing contained in this contract shall prevent CONTRACTOR from employing such independent professional associates as CONTRACTOR to assist in the performance of services hereunder. The CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor. In such regard, any and all officers, employees, servants and agents of the contractor shall be deemed employees, servants and agents of the CONTRACTOR and not that of the COUNTY.
7. Services to be Provided by CONTRACTOR. In consideration of the compensation to be paid by the COUNTY, CONTRACTOR shall perform the following services:

Corners A-1, A-8, A-9, A-10, A-11, A-12, A-13, B-13, M-10, M-11, M-12 & MC1 are common with one or more adjacent townships.

**C. Project Details.** RESEARCH shall consist of a thorough investigation of all available sources and include copies of pertinent supporting documents and data. REMONUMENTATION shall consist of field reconnaissance of existing monumentation and references; any required measurements or calculations; a Land Corner Recordation Certificate; presentation to, and acceptance of, the Otsego County Peer Review Group; placement of an Otsego County Monument provided by the COUNTY, and a record of the date of completion of specific tasks on a form provided by the COUNTY. The COUNTY will record all Land Corner Recordation Certificates after acceptance by the Otsego County Peer Review Group. COORDINATES shall consist of State Plane Coordinates established in accordance with the requirement of the Office of Land Survey and Remonumentation.

This Contract requires that all survey work be performed in accordance with Act 345 of Public Acts 1990 as amended, being Section 54.261 to 54.279 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, and the County Plan as adopted by the State Survey Commission and to follow any rules set by the State, including Memorandum No. 16. From time to time the Peer Group will outline a specific procedure to recover or replace a Government corner. It is required that these instructions be followed to the best of the Contractor's ability.

8. **Indemnification.** CONTRACTOR shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the County its boards, commissioners, officers, employees and agents against all claims of loss, damage and/or injury arising out of the performance of services by CONTRACTOR under this Agreement or that may be sustained in or upon the County owned or leased premises from any actions or omissions of CONTRACTOR. Such indemnification shall survive the termination of this Agreement. By entering this Agreement, neither party waives any immunities granted by law.
9. **Insurance.** CONTRACTOR, shall at its sole expense, obtain and maintain in full force and effect at all times during the term of this Agreement, the following insurance coverages, in a form acceptable to the County, with responsible insurance companies licensed and admitted to do business in the State of Michigan. CONTRACTOR shall provide the COUNTY with proof of insurance prior to commencement of this Agreement.

**A. General Liability Insurance.** General liability insurance with limits of liability not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence for the protection of the COUNTY and the State of Michigan against all claims, liabilities, obligations, damages, claims, judgments, costs and expenses, damages, and expenses for bodily injury or death, personal injury and/or damage to property that may arise out of CONTRACTOR's negligent act, error or wrongful conduct incident to or arising out of the services provided under this Agreement, or that may be sustained in or upon the COUNTY premises and the State of Michigan (and its agents and employees) from any actions or omissions of CONTRACTOR (or anyone directly or indirectly employed by it).

B. Motor Vehicle Liability. Motor vehicle liability insurance of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and aggregate, including Michigan no-fault coverages.

C. Each insurance policy shall name the County as an Additional Insured and shall contain a provision that the policy cannot be terminated, canceled, or substantially altered without thirty (30) days written notice to the County.

10. Sufficiency of Performance. Strict performance of the terms of this Agreement is necessary, and even substantial performance in good faith and without willful failure will not be deemed sufficient performance. Strict performance will be deemed the essence of this Agreement. In the event of CONTRACTOR's failure to timely perform the services under this Agreement, the COUNTY may, upon notice to CONTRACTOR, seek alternative means of obtaining the services.

11. Termination. This Agreement may be terminated prior to the expiration of its term as follows:

A. By mutual written agreement of the parties; or

B. In the event of default or breach of this Agreement by either party, the other party may terminate this contract immediately.

C. Either party may terminate this Agreement, with or without cause, upon 30 days prior written notice to the party.

12. Effect of Termination. In the event of termination of this Agreement pursuant to Section 11, CONTRACTOR will be entitled to the monies provided herein only through date of termination.

**OTSEGO COUNTY 2012 MONUMENTATION/REMONUMENTATION PROGRAM  
AGREEMENT FOR COUNTY REPRESENTATIVE SERVICES**

1. **Parties.** This agreement made this Twenty-Eighth day of February, 2012, by and between the County of Otsego, a Michigan Municipal Corporation, of Gaylord, Michigan 49735, hereafter COUNTY, and Ronald C. Brand, PS., located at 533 Greenfield Drive, Gaylord, Michigan, hereafter CONTRACTOR.
  
2. **Term.** Unless earlier terminated as provided in this Agreement, the term of this Agreement will commence on January 1, 2012, and continue until December 31, 2012.
  
3. **Definitions.**
  - A. **County Grant Administrator.** Means a person appointed by the Otsego County Board of Commissioners as the individual responsible for completing and submitting the annual Application for a survey and Monumentation Grant to the State of Michigan, and the administering of the approved annual grant.
  
  - B. **County Representative.** Means the County Surveyor, whether elected or appointed, pursuant to Section 95 of Chapter 14 of the Revised Statutes of 1846, being Section 54.95 of the Michigan Compiled Laws
  
  - C. **County Surveyor.** Means the County Surveyor, whether elected or appointed, pursuant to Section 95 of Chapter 14 of the Revised Statutes of 1846, being Section 54.95 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.
  
  - D. **Peer Group.** Means not less than three non-associated surveyors appointed by the County Representative. One member of the Peer Group shall be the County Representative, who shall act as chair.
  
4. **Compensation.** The CONTRACTOR shall perform all work for the PROJECT for the total amount not to exceed **Two Thousand One Hundred and 00/100 dollars (US \$2,100.00)**. The PROJECT shall be defined as completion of all duties listed in Section 7, Services to be Provided by CONTRACTOR.
  
5. **Payment of Compensation.** The OWNER will pay the CONTRACTOR for the work when the required work listed in Section 7, Services to be Provided by CONTRACTOR, is completed by the CONTRACTOR.

If the CONTRACTOR fails to meet the deadlines contained within this contract, payment may be withheld at the option of the County Grant Administrator. In the event that the CONTRACTOR fails to meet the deadlines specified within this contract by at least fourteen days, there will be a reduction of \$50.00 per day from the Compensation total beginning on day fifteen.

Payment for partial completion of contracts shall be allowed at the discretion of the Grant Administrator. Requests for payment for partial completion of contract will not be routinely approved in order to encourage timely performance of the contract.

6. Subcontracting. Nothing contained in this contract shall prevent CONTRACTOR from employing such independent professional associates as CONTRACTOR to assist in the performance of services hereunder. The CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor. In such regard, any and all officers, employees, servants and agents of the contractor shall be deemed employees, servants and agents of the CONTRACTOR and not that of the COUNTY.
7. Services to be Provided by CONTRACTOR. In consideration of the compensation to be paid by the COUNTY, CONTRACTOR shall perform the following services:
  - A. Establishing, scheduling meetings of, and chairing a Peer Group which will meet and act as advisors for ratification of corner locations. These meetings shall be in compliance with the Open Meetings Act. Peer Group meetings shall be scheduled as to allow for all assigned Remonumentation corners, other than corners tabled until the following grant cycle, to be reviewed and ratified by October 1, 2012.
  - B. Evaluation of all completed Land Corner Recordation Certificate(s). Such work to be completed by October 30, 2012.
  - C. Creating and maintaining a filing system for each corner, which contains all survey information compiled.
  - D. Submitting documentation to the County Grant Administrator as required for the annual Application for Monumentation Grant which includes, but is not limited to the following:
    1. A general work-progress report for all current awarded contracts, by October 1, 2012.
    2. For the current-year projects, a description of the work area completed, and the work remaining to be completed. Such completion report will be completed by November 15, 2012.
    3. The Work Program for the following year. Such Work Program will be completed by November 30, 2012. The Work Program will indicate (a) the area where the Public Land Survey corners and Property-controlling corners are proposed to be monumented and/or remonumented and coordinates set within the next contract year; (b) the area where the Public Land Surveyor corners and Property-controlling corners are to be researched in the next contract year; (c) the area where horizontal and vertical control stations are to be researched and located; and (d) the area where horizontal and vertical coordinates are to be established.

The County Representative will consult with and obtain the consent of the Grant Administrator when drafting the Work Program and Remonumentation Grant Application for the following year.

- E. Any other duties contained in the Monumentation and Remonumentation Plan for Otsego County, Michigan or those contained in Act 345, of the Public Acts of 1990, the State Survey and Remonumentation Act, being Sections 54.261 to 54.279 of the Michigan Compiled Laws and to follow any rules set by the State, including Memorandum No. 16.
8. Motor Vehicle Liability Insurance. Proof of Motor vehicle liability insurance of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and aggregate, including Michigan no-fault coverages.
9. Sufficiency of Performance. Strict performance of the terms of this Agreement is necessary, and even substantial performance in good faith and without willful failure will not be deemed sufficient performance. Strict performance will be deemed the essence of this Agreement. In the event of CONTRACTOR's failure to timely perform the services under this Agreement, the COUNTY may, upon notice to CONTRACTOR, seek alternative means of obtaining the services.
10. Termination. This Agreement may be terminated prior to the expiration of its term as follows:
- A. By mutual written agreement of the parties; or
- B. In the event of default or breach of this Agreement by either party, the other party may terminate this contract immediately.
11. Effect of Termination. In the event of termination of this Agreement pursuant to Section 10, CONTRACTOR will be entitled to the monies provided herein only through date of termination.

**ORDINANCE No. 2012-1**

**OTSEGO COUNTY LOUIS M. GROEN NATURE PRESERVE ORDINANCE**

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE USES AND ACTIVITIES (AND OTHER MATTERS) WITH REGARD TO THE LOUIS M. GROEN NATURE PRESERVE AND TO PROVIDE FOR PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, Section 11(j) of the County Boards of Commissioners Act, MCL 46.11(j), provides that a county board of commissioners, by majority vote of the members of the county board of commissioners, elected and serving, may pass ordinances that relate to county affairs and do not contravene the general laws of the State of Michigan or interfere with the local affairs of a township, city, or village within the limits of the county, and can further provide suitable sanctions for the violation of those ordinances.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNTY OF OTSEGO, MICHIGAN, HEREBY ORDAINS:

**Section 1 Purpose and Intent**

The Otsego County Board of Commissioners hereby finds that it is necessary for the public health, safety, and welfare to regulate the use, maintenance, and other aspects of the Louis M. Groen Nature Preserve. It is the intent of this Ordinance to minimize problems associated with trespass, trail use, litter, parking, and similar matters with regard to the Louis M. Groen Nature Preserve.

**Section 2 Title**

This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited and referred to as the "Louis M. Groen Nature Preserve Ordinance," and shall hereinafter be referred to as the "Ordinance".

**Section 3 Definitions. As used in this Ordinance**

"Authorized Use" means a use on the Preserve that has been authorized by the Board through ordinance or resolution, or through the posting of a notice or the establishment of a written policy.

"Board" means the Otsego County Board of Commissioners.

"Bicycle Trail" means any trail designated by the Commission for bicycle riding.

"Commission" means the Otsego County Parks and Recreation Commission.

"County" means Otsego County.

“Equestrian Trail” means any trail designated by the Commission for horseback riding.

“Hours of Operation” means the time periods during which the Preserve is open to the public, as established from time to time by the Commission.

“Pedestrian Trail” means any trail designated by the Commission for uses that include walking, hiking, jogging, skiing, or snowshoeing.

“Person” means any individual, partnership, association, or corporation.

“Preserve” means the Louis M. Groen Nature Preserve.

“Vehicle” means any device intended to transport a person or people or another vehicle or vehicles from one place to another.

“Water Craft” means any vehicle intended to be used for transportation on the water or ice.

#### **Section 4      Applicability**

This Ordinance shall apply to the real property located within Charlton Township, Otsego County, Michigan, commonly known as the Groen M. Nature Preserve and legally described in Quit Claim Deed Liber 1272 Page(s) 480-483, recorded in the Otsego County Register of Deeds.

#### **Section 5      Hours of Operation**

The hours of operation of the Preserve shall be set and posted by the Otsego County Parks and Recreation Commission. No person shall enter at any other point than through the designated Parking Area referenced in Section 5. No person shall enter the property outside of posted hours of operation unless receiving written permission from the Otsego County Parks and Recreation Director, the Otsego County Administrator, or the County Board of Commissioners Chairperson.

#### **Section 6      Fees**

There shall be no fee for entering the Preserve. The County may, at its discretion, by resolution or motion, set any required fees for any services or similar matters provided at the Preserve.

#### **Section 7      Use at Own Risk**

Any person who utilizes the Preserve does so at that person’s own risk.

#### **Section 8      Traffic and Parking**

No person shall drive, park, or store any vehicle within the Preserve, except in the areas specifically designated for such purposes. No vehicle or person shall block any entrance, exit, or parking area within the Preserve. Any parking area which is designated with a handicap parking sign shall be utilized only by handicapped persons as defined by Michigan law. It shall be unlawful for any person to allow a vehicle under his or her control to remain parked on the

Preserve property at a time other than the hours of operation. The County has the authority to remove or tow any vehicle which is improperly parked, placed, or stored anywhere within the Preserve, and the owner of such vehicle shall be responsible for reimbursing the County for any and all towing or removal costs and expenses. This provision does not apply to vehicles or equipment utilized by the County or the Commission for the maintenance and upkeep of the Preserve, and for the enforcement of this Ordinance.

## **Section 9      Uses Prohibited**

No person shall commit any of the following acts on Preserve property:

- a. Any residential, commercial, or industrial use;
- b. use of any vehicle or water craft except such vehicles or water craft utilized by the County or the Commission for the maintenance and upkeep of the Preserve. This subsection does not apply to use of vehicles in specifically designated parking areas, the use of non-motorized water craft for educational purposes as authorized by the Commission, and the use of Mechanized Aid for Persons with Disabilities;
- c. deposit, dump, or place any ashes, trash, rubbish, paper, garbage, refuse, debris or junk, except in containers provided by the Preserve for such purposes;
- d. destroy, deface, paint, alter, hide, change, break, mark upon, damage, take, remove, or excavate any Preserve property;
- e. remove or take any antiquities, artifacts, or other items found on the Preserve from the Preserve property;
- f. cut, remove, uproot, destroy, chip, blaze, box, paint, girdle, trim, deface, injure, break, remove, pick, or gather any portion of any tree, tree sapling, seedling, bush, shrub, flower, plant, mushroom, branch, berry, fruit, foliage, seed, sod, earth, downed timber, wood chips, peat, rock, sand, gravel, or any other natural material;
- g. perform any mowing, trimming, cutting, or pruning of any trees or other vegetation, living or dead, other than is reasonably required to be conducted by the County or the Commission for the safety of users of the Preserve, for control of active fire, and prevention of fire and disease, including exotic intrusion, and for restoration or enhancement of wildlife habitat;
- h. hunt, fish, pursue, trap, catch, disturb, molest, poison, remove, wound or kill any animal or fish, or disturb, molest, or rob the nest, lair, den, or burrow of any animal, unless necessary to keep the animal and fish populations within numbers consistent with the ecological balance of the Preserve property or as necessary to protect public health and safety. Notwithstanding the foregoing, supervised and educational catch and release fishing as authorized by the Board or Commission or their appointed representatives, shall be permitted;
- i. use of any chemical or biological pesticide, herbicide, or other substance or measure designed to kill or restrict any plant or insect;

- j. build a camp fire on the ground. A camp fire off the ground in a contained structure may be permitted in an area designated for such purpose.
- k. build a fire in a manner that threatens Preserve property;
- l. drop, throw away, or scatter any burning, lighted or hot colas, ashes, cigarette, cigar, firecracker, match, or other burning matter;
- m. leave a fire unattended or before it is extinguished to the point that its ashes, residue, and colas are cold to the human touch, unless such ashes, residue, or colas are deposited in a container designated by the Preserve for such purpose;
- n. ice skating on any of the lakes within the Preserve;
- o. interfere with, unreasonably disrupt, or delay any person employed or contracted by the County or Commission to maintain and supervise the Preserve, in the performance of his or her duties;
- p. set off or attempt to ignite any firecracker, fireworks, smoke bombs, rockets, black powder guns, or other pyrotechnics;
- q. engage in behavior or speech that provokes a breach of the peace or intimidates or unreasonably interferes with others in the normal, safe use of the Preserve property;
- r. disobey, ignore, or fail to comply with any lawful direction or order given by a person employed or contracted by the County or Commission to maintain and supervise the Preserve;
- s. be legally intoxicated or under the influence of any illegal controlled substance;
- t. consume or possess any alcoholic beverage, if such person is under the age of 21 years;
- u. possess, use, plant, cultivate, tend, or harvest any illegal controlled substances, including cannabis or any derivative thereof;
- v. give or deliver any alcoholic beverage to any person under the age of 21 years;
- w. use or possess any weapon including, without limitation, handgun, rifle, shotgun, bow and arrow, slingshot, cross bow, spear, spear gun, switchblade knife, stiletto, sword, blackjack, billy club, whip, axe, any weapon capable of discharging a projective by air, spirit, gas or explosive, any explosive substance, or harmful solid, liquid or gaseous substance, or any other dangerous weapon. This subsection does not apply to a concealed pistol carried by a person pursuant to a valid concealed pistol license provided however, that the person carrying the concealed pistol must have in his or her possession, the license to carry the pistol;

- x. quarrying, ditching, diking, draining, filling, excavating, dredging, removal of topsoil or other materials, or changing the topography of the land in any manner, except when necessary to maintain, preserve, and protect the natural features of the Preserve;
- y. smoking;
- z. use of glass containers;
- aa. bring in, or allow to remain, any dog that is on a leash longer six feet;
- bb. bring in, or allow to remain, any vicious or dangerous horse, dog, or other animal;
- cc. ride a horse on any area in the Preserve, other than an Equestrian Trail as designated by the Commission;
- dd. ride a bicycle on any area of the Preserve, other than a Bicycle Trail as designated by the Commission;
- ee. camping or overnight stays other than camping for educational purposes as authorize by the Commission;
- ff. gamble or play any game of chance; or
- gg. do or engage in any indecent, lascivious, lewd or improper act or conduct.

## **Section 10     Damage**

Any person causing damage to the Preserve (or to any tree, flora, fauna, structure, building, or item within the Preserve) shall be responsible for fully reimbursing the County for any and all costs and expenses associated with the repair of the damage or replacement of the damaged item.

## **Section 11     Compliance with Rules and Regulations**

Anyone using the Preserve or present at or on the Preserve shall comply with any and all rules and regulations regarding the Preserve adopted by the Board or the Commission.

## **Section 12     Authority of a County or Police Official**

Any person directed by a police officer, law enforcement agent, or a County employee or person contracted by the County for supervision of the Preserve, to leave the Preserve shall do so promptly and peaceably. Any person carrying a concealed pistol upon the Preserve property must produce a valid license to carry the concealed pistol to a police officer, law enforcement agent, or a County employee or person contracted by the County for supervision of the Preserve. Failure to produce a valid license to carry the concealed pistol would subject the pistol to immediate seizure by the police officer, law enforcement agent, or a County employee or person contracted by the County for supervision of the Preserve. If a police officer or law enforcement agent seized the pistol, the person shall have 45 days in which to display his or her license or documentation to an authorized employee of the law enforcement entity that employs the police

officer or law enforcement agent. If the pistol is seized by a County employee or person contracted by the County for supervision of the Preserve, the person shall have 45 days in which to display his or her license or documentation to the County Administrator or Commission Director.

### **Section 13 Violation; Penalties, Remedies, and Enforcement**

A violation of this Ordinance constitutes a municipal civil infraction. Any person, who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with any provision of this Ordinance, or any amendment thereof, or any person who knowingly or intentionally aids or abets another person in violation of this Ordinance, shall be in violation of this Ordinance and shall be responsible for a civil infraction. The civil fine for a municipal civil infraction shall be not less than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) or more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), in addition to all other costs, damages, expenses and remedies provided by law. Subsequent offenses shall be subject to an increased civil fine as follows:

- i. The fine for a first subsequent offense shall be not less than Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00), in addition to all other costs, damages, and expenses.
- ii. The fine for additional subsequent offenses shall be not less than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), in addition to all other costs, damages, and expenses.

For purposes of this Section, “subsequent offense” means a violation of the provisions of this Ordinance committed by the same person within twelve (12) months of a previous violation of the same provision of this Ordinance or similar provision of this Ordinance for which said person admitted responsibility or was adjudged to be responsible. Each day during which any violation continues shall be deemed a separate offense.

The following officials are authorized to issue municipal civil infraction tickets/citations pursuant to this Ordinance:

- Deputies of the Otsego County Sheriff’s Department
- Officers of the City of Gaylord Police Department
- Officers of the Michigan State Police
- Conservation Officers of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources
- Employees of the Otsego County Parks and Recreation Commission

### **Section 14 Exceptions**

Specific provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to any County official, County contractor, law enforcement officer, or firefighting or emergency personnel, engaged in a lawful governmental function, use or activity.

Additional exceptions to the mandate of this Ordinance may be granted only by special permission from the Commission, Commission Director, County Administrator, or the Board Chairperson. Such permissions shall not conflict with the provisions of the Conservation Easement recorded under Liber 1271, Pages 786-805, recorded in the Otsego County Register of Deeds.

**Section 15 Severability**

In the event that any one or more sections, subsections, provisions, phrases, or words of this Ordinance shall be found to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not affect the validity or the enforceability of the remaining sections, subsections, provisions, phrases, or other words of this Ordinance.

**Section 16 Effective Date**

The Ordinance shall be effective on the day when notice of its adoption is published in a newspaper of general circulation in Otsego County.

## *“Presumptive” Disability Benefits for Certain Groups of Veterans*

### What is “Presumptive” Service Connection?

VA presumes that specific disabilities diagnosed in certain veterans were caused by their military service. VA does this because of the unique circumstances of their military service. If one of these conditions is diagnosed in a veteran in one of these groups, VA presumes that the circumstances of his/her service caused the condition, and disability compensation can be awarded.

### What Conditions are “Presumed” to be Caused by Military Service?

Veterans in the groups identified below: Entitlement to disability compensation may be presumed under the circumstances described and for the conditions listed.

Veterans within one year of release from active duty: Veterans diagnosed with chronic diseases (such as arthritis, diabetes, or hypertension) are encouraged to apply for disability compensation.

Veterans with continuous service of 90 days or more: Veterans diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS)/Lou Gehrig’s disease at any time after discharge or release from qualifying active service is sufficient to establish service connection for the disease, if the veteran had active, continuous service of 90 days or more.

## What Is VA Disability Compensation?

Disability compensation is a tax-free benefit paid to a veteran for disabilities that are a result of or made worse by injuries or diseases that happened while on active duty, active duty for training, or inactive duty training. Disability compensation is also paid to certain veterans disabled from VA health care.

## Who Is Eligible?

You may be eligible for disability compensation if you have a service-related disability and you were discharged under other than dishonorable conditions.

## How Much Does VA Pay?

The amount of basic benefit paid ranges from \$123 to \$2,673 per month, depending on how disabled you are.

**Note:** *You may be paid additional amounts, in certain instances, if:*

- you have very severe disabilities or loss of limb(s)
- you have a spouse, child(ren), or dependent parent(s)
- you have a seriously disabled spouse

## How Can You Apply?

Proposed New Language

**18.42 Trash Receptacles / Dumpsters**

18.42.1 Residential Trash Receptacles shall be placed at curbside no earlier than 24 hours from the scheduled pick-up day. Any trash receptacle placed at curb side shall be removed from curb side no later than 24 hours after the scheduled pick-up day.

18.42.2 Commercial Trash Receptacles / Dumpsters may be placed upon a parcel of land in such a manner to facilitate loading and unloading. They may be placed no closer than 10 feet to any adjoining property. All Trash Receptacles shall be properly maintained with working lids and the lids shall be maintained in a closed position.

18.42.2.1 During the site plan review process the Planning Commission or Zoning Administrator may require Commercial Businesses abutting land zoned Residential (R1, R2, R3, RR) or existing residential development in other zoning districts to maintain a greater setback than ten (10) feet but in no case shall the required setback be greater than twenty five (25) feet.

18.42.3 Temporary Commercial Construction Dumpsters are exempt from these regulations.

18.43.4 Trash receptacles / Dumpsters meeting the requirements of 18.42.1, 18.42.2 & 18.42.3 shall not be considered unsightly areas as covered in 18.18.5.

20.2.2.20 Location, size of all trash receptacles and other solid waste disposal facilities.

Current Language:

18.18.5 Screening of Unsightly Areas:

Unsightly areas, including but not limited to outside trash receptacles, loading docks, outside storage areas, utility boxes and open areas where machinery or vehicles are stored or repaired, shall be screened from public sidewalks, streets and other areas from which the property is visible. Such screening shall not be located as to interfere with required maintenance activities of utility boxes.

Whenever plants are used as a screen, they should provide an effective opaque screen within three (3) years of the time they are planted.

The materials and colors of the screen should blend with the site and the surroundings.

Enclosures shall be placed around dumpsters and other trash receptacles. Dumpsters shall be entirely screened from view. The enclosures should prevent trash from being scattered by wind or animals. The dumpster shall be placed on a concrete pad, enclosed by an opaque screen at least six feet in height, with opaque gates. The enclosure shall be sturdy and built with quality wood or masonry materials. The trash enclosures shall be sited so the service vehicle has convenient access to the enclosure and has room to maneuver without backing onto a public right-of-way.

18.18.5 Screening of Unsightly Areas:

Unsightly areas, including but not limited to outside storage areas, utility boxes and open areas where machinery or vehicles are stored or repaired, shall be screened from public sidewalks, streets and other areas from which the property is visible. Such screening shall not be located as to interfere with required maintenance activities of utility boxes.

Whenever plants are used as a screen, they should provide an effective opaque screen within three (3) years of the time they are planted.
